People in Need (PIN) is a non-governmental, non-profit, international organization founded in the Czech Republic in 1992. PIN arrived in Nepal as part of a humanitarian response to the April 25th, 2015 earthquake. Since its inception in Nepal, PIN has had a strong role advocating and addressing the needs of marginalized populations. This includes people who live in geographically remote areas of Nepal, people who are from historically marginalized ethnic groups, and those marginalized because of their age and/or gender identity (women and girls). More recently, PIN has also supported Nepal's post-earthquake reconstruction efforts ensuring that the most vulnerable people are not left behind.

Program objective

Providing geo-hazard displaced, potentially displaced and landless households with a viable chance to compliantly reconstruct their houses after receiving new land and shelter support from the government's relocation and RHRG programs.

Support provided by the Consortium

- Support for the NRA to continue designing, scaling up, and implementing durable solution programs to ensure that geo-hazard displaced, potentially displaced and landless households are enabled to reconstruct their shelters on safe land.
- Ensure that geo-hazard displaced and potentially displaced populations are adequately informed about the relevant policies, their communities' geo-hazard categorization and available durable solutions.
- Ensure that households have the critical life documents needed to access government designed solutions.
- Assist in ensuring that households are supported to enroll in both relocation programs and the Rural Housing Reconstruction Grant.
- Building the resilience of displaced and relocated households through protection, preparedness and the provision of technical assistance.

Key Definitions

GEO-HAZARD ASSESSMENT: A recognized assessment conducted by the NRA in coordination with other agencies that categorizes a particular population living at a location with a potential or actual geo-hazard as one of three different risk categories.


GEO-HAZARD DISPLACED PERSON (GDP): A person or household who have relocated themselves permanently or temporarily during times of high risk because of their perceived risk to safety from geo-hazards caused by the earthquake within the 14 key affected districts. All geo-hazard displaced people are IDPs but GDPs could be from any category of Geo-hazard.

POTENTIALLY DISPLACED PERSON (PDP): A person or households who have not relocated themselves but are at risk of displacement.

CATEGORY 1 HOUSEHOLDS: Households whose livelihoods and/or shelters are at a safe location to begin reconstruction.

CATEGORY 2 HOUSEHOLDS: Households whose livelihoods and/or shelters are unsafe due to the existing state of geo-hazards, but the safety risk of these geo-hazards can be effectively and sufficiently mitigated. Sites with geo-hazards that pose threat to human life or settlements but cannot be made safe due to cost-effectiveness should be considered as Category 3 sites.

CATEGORY 3 HOUSEHOLDS: Households whose livelihoods and/or shelters are unsafe due to the existing state of geo-hazards, and the safety risk of these geo-hazards cannot be sufficiently mitigated for technical or financial reasons. Reconstruction at these sites is not recommended and households who live on, or routinely visit, these sites are at high risk.
